Week 23 – Sample Essay

Jade:	Watch out!	(Joe falls downwards)

- **Joe:** Ow, that hurt!
- Jade: (sounding sympathetic) Are you alright?
- **Joe:** What do you think? (*In a whisper*) Sorry. I think I've twisted my ankle.
- Jade: (anxiously) What shall we do? (Wrapping a scarf around his leg) Is that better?
- Joe: A little.

Leaning on Jade, he managed to limp down the hill. His ankle begins to swell.

Jade:	Faster. It's getting very dark. Soon we won't be able to see the path.
Joe:	(moaning) OK.
Jade:	You're doing really well. Keep going.
Joe:	I will keep going but it really hurts.

The stage darkens slowly. Joe continues to stumble as he leans on Jade. Jade is visibly exhausted but tries her best to support her friend. They hear a loud howling in the near distance. They both freeze.

Joe: Jade: Joe:	<i>(His eyes dart around anxiously)</i> What was that? Hopefully we'll never have to find out. How's your ankle? <i>(Looks down doubtfully)</i> Worse.
Jade:	(groans) Oh boy. (She stoops down and begins to rummage in her rucksack) Did you bring your torch? I can't find mine anywhere.
Joe:	(He rummages in his pockets, pulling out miscellaneous items: a pen, a toothbrush, a coat hanger)
Jade:	A coat hanger?
Joe:	(<i>mutters to himself</i>) I knew I'd find that hanger somewhere. (<i>He whips out a torch excitedly</i>) There it i- (The batteries fall out and tumble down the hill) Oh. Oh no!
Jade:	(Gasps) Joe! That was our only hope!

They hear the howling again. It is much louder than the last.

- **Joe:** (squealing. He leaps onto Jade's back)
- Jade: Get off me, you coward! If anyone is getting eaten tonight, it's you! There is a rustling in the trees nearby.
- Joe: Or both of us...Run!



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Joe and Jade grab their rucksacks. Jade begins to run. Joe hobbles behind. Joe trips on the scarf wrapped around his ankle. He stumbles and falls.

- Joe: (desperately) Jade! Help!
- Jade: (looks behind her. She begins to run back to Joe, then stops in her tracks. She turns pale).

A large wolf emerges behind Joe. His eyes are large and yellow. He is snarling. Saliva drips from his teeth.

Jade: (slowly and steadily) Joe, don't panic, but-A large crowd: Surprise!

A sheet is thrown off the wolf to reveal four of Joe and Jade's classmates underneath: Ryan, Michelle, Gregg and Louise. They are grinning.

Joe:	II(he faints)
Louise:	(jumping up and down) We got them! We got them!
Jade:	What a horrible trick! I'd expect something like this from Ryan, Gregg
	and Louise, but you Michelle? I'm shocked. I'm telling Mr. Morrison as
	soon as we get back to base camp.
Michelle:	Well actually, it was his idea (she sniggers).
Gregg:	Come on. Let's get back. Allison is meant to be cooking up a mean
	casserole tonight and I want to get to base camp before it's all gone.

Ryan and Gregg pick up Joe. Louise takes his backpack. The crowd begin down the hill. Michelle and Louise cackle noisily. Jade sulks at first, but soon begins to laugh with the other girls. Suddenly, they hear a distant howling.

Jade:	Stop it boys. The prank is over.
Gregg and	Ryan: (In unison) It wasn't us!
Louise:	Well if it wasn't you, who was it?
Michelle:	(slowly) More like, what was it?

The lights dim to black.

A NOTE FROM THE TEACHER TO STUDENT:

You would have scored maximum marks for a good balance between speech and stage directions, both for how speech should be said and what actions are needed. There should also be a smooth transition between the prompt given and your continuation of the play script. Remember, this is a continuation, so should be complete with a beginning, middle and end. You would also need to show appreciation that the play would take place on a stage. This can be shown through your stage directions. Punctuation should be used to express characters feelings, through exclamation marks for example. Characters should be distinct, and their personality should be visible through speech.
